hereinafter called the Lessor, and the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, hereinafter called the Government:		
WHEREAS, the parties hereto desire to amend the above Lease to issue notice to proceed on the tenant improvements (a portion to be amortized in the rent and also a portion to be paid lump sum), to provide invoicing directions for the work to be paid lump sum, to include updated American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Reporting Requirements, and to amend the Storage Function early access requirement.		
NOW THEREFORE, these parties for the considerations hereinafter mentioned covenant and agree that the said Lease is amended, effective <u>August 31, 2010</u> as follows:		
A. This SLA serves as a Notice to Proceed for the Tenant Improvements build out in the amount of \$23,722,938.96.		
The total cost of Tenant Improvements is \$23,722,938.96. Of that amount, \$2,050,595.65 shall be amortized over two hundred forty (240) months at an interest rate of six percent (6%). The balance, \$21,672,343.31, shall be paid to the Lessor via a one time lump sum payment upon completion, inspection and acceptance of the tenant improvement work by the Government.		
B. Upon completion of the work, the Lessor shall notify the Contracting Officer to arrange for an inspection. After inspection and acceptance of work by the Government, a properly executed original invoice shall be submitted to: General Services Administration (GSA) Greater Southwest Region (7BCP) P.O. - D. Paragraph 1.20.F of the Lease, entitled "Summary of Early Access," is hereby amended by deleting the ninth (9) function line item in the "TABLE OF EARLY REQUIREMENTS," entitled "Storage*," in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

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
